Eligible HHSP Program Costs for Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response

Federal guidance states that "Individuals experiencing homelessness are at greater risk of exposure to a variety of infectious diseases including influenza and coronavirus. Taking effective sanitation measures can reduce the spread of infectious disease for people who are unsheltered or living in emergency shelters." HHSP Subrecipients may use HHSP operations funds for supplies and services to reduce the spread of infectious disease in their emergency shelters or in transitional living activities. In addition, HHSP Subrecipients may use case management, essential services, homelessness prevention or homeless assistance to mitigate the effects of infectious disease on individuals and families who may experience a loss of income due to infectious disease and as a result be at risk of homelessness. Eligible Costs to Support Infectious Disease Mitigation

Essential Services Essential services are to assist Homeless Households or Households At-risk of Homelessness to find or maintain housing stability				
Out-patient medical services	Out-patient medical costs for Program Participants. This service must be required to find or maintain stable housing.			
Child care	Child care costs for Program Participants due to school or daycare closures. These services must be required to find or maintain stable housing.			
Mental health services	Mental health services due to anxiety or stress over infectious disease and social distancing in the community. These services must be required to find or maintain stable housing.			
Transportation	Transportation costs for Program Participants to travel to and from medical care. These services must be required to find or maintain stable housing.
