56 Hey, Brooke. Okay. Approval of minutes, can't do it. 57 Next, we'll get an update on Section 811 from Bill 58 Cranor.

60 Bill Cranor (0:01:41):

Okay. The first thing I want to talk about is money 61 because there was a new NOFA put out in January and then 62 63 when we changed administrations, it was pulled back. We 64 don't know if it will or won't be reissued, but if it is 65 reissued, we do intend to apply for those funds. We were awarded funds for 2023 and we are still waiting for 66 the cooperative agreements for those to get those funds. 67 68 The federal government may be busy right now, I don't know. We currently filed 485 people housed, 47 of those 69

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70 are new 2019 people that we just got started on last 71 year.

72

73 Over the last 90 days, 14 percent of our people have 74 been from our target populations where we have the preference, which are people exiting from foster care, 75 people exiting from nursing facilities, people exiting 76 from intermediate care facilities. That preference was 77 78 put in place because historically, we were at about 9 79 percent or less. And so over the last year, we've been 80 somewhere between 20 and 15 percent, usually, so we've really almost doubled the amount of those people that we 81 have are getting into the program to cover those target 82 83 populations. And so that's pretty much what I have, 84 unless anybody had a question.

138 Matthew Lovitt (0:04:08):

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139 Good morning, everyone. As Bobby just mentioned and as 140 I introduced myself a second ago, my name is Matthew 141 Lovitt. I'm the senior Legislative Affairs Advisor here Thank you for the opportunity to be here this 142 at TDHCA. morning to share a little bit about the happenings thus 143 144 far in the 89th session and what we anticipate to happen 145 in the next couple of months as the session marches 146 towards sine die on June 2nd. Before I begin, the 147 slides I'll be referencing are behind your agenda in the 148 event that you want to follow along with the talking 149 points that I'll be providing. For those of you who are 150 on the phone, I will provide the slides to Jeremy and Elizabeth, and they can distribute them if you're 151 interested in those slides. 152

153

154 So for today's agenda for what I want to talk about, 155 like I mentioned, I'm going to provide a guick overview 156 of the 89th session, what's happened so far, what we can 157 expect going forward over the next couple of months. 158 I'm going to highlight a few relevant bills or bills 159 that I feel are relevant to this particular group. 160 There are many that we are following at TDHCA so I just wanted to select a few that I can share with you, and if 161

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you have questions or things like that, we can conclude today's conversation with those and I'll do my best, of course, to provide the answers. Should I say next slide? I feel so weird referencing slides. Anyways. Next slide, I guess.

167

168 So for those of you I don't know how familiar or I'm not 169 familiar with how closely this group monitors the 170 legislature, so I'm going to start with just some 171 general overview of what's happened so far and starting 172 with some key dates. As you're probably aware, the session convened on January 14th, the second Tuesday of 173 January, and for the first 30 days, typically they're 174 175 limited to discussions on Governor Abbott's priority 176 items. Governor Abbott didn't announce his priority 177 items until like the end of January. Those emergency 178 items are property tax relief, water infrastructure, 179 teacher compensation, career readiness, which generally 180 refers to the trades like welding, plumbing, things like 181 that; school vouchers or school savings accounts, 182 depending upon your preference; bail reform and then 183 cybersecurity. The second 30 days, which is where we currently are right now, committees can start 184

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185 consideration of non-emergency items.

186

187 They can't vote on those items until after March 14th, 188 which is the filing deadline. March 14th, obviously 189 again, as I just mentioned, is when House and Senate on 190 the floor can start taking votes on those non-emergency 191 items. Before that, so currently in this period, 192 they're limited to conversations and votes on those 193 emergency items. Property taxes, probably which a lot 194 of the people you mentioned were in the garage, 195 (indiscernible) 0:06:39) and probably here for property 196 taxes, or any of a number of those emergency items that are eligible for discussion on the Senate and House 197 198 floor at this particular time. Sine die is June 2nd. The deadline for the governor's signature on legislation 199 is June 22. And then the date at which most of the 200 201 bills that are passed this session will become effective 202 is September 1 of 2025 this year.

203

204 So going to the next slide, more general updates related 205 to legislative operations. There is a new speaker of 206 the House. I don't know if you guys have been 207 following. There was a little bit of intra party drama

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208 between Representative Burrows from Lubbock and 209 Representative Cook from Mansfield, who was going to be 210 the next Speaker. Ultimately, Rep. Burrows won the 211 speakership, so he is leading the charge in the House. 212 Senate leadership, more or less the same. Going back to 213 the House side, we do have a new Oversight Committee 214 through which most TDHCA bills go or funnel, that is a 215 combination of County Affairs and Urban Affairs. 216 They've now come together to the Intergovernmental 217 Affairs. Excuse me. It's chaired by Cecil Bell out of 218 Mayfield. I forget. It starts with an M, so it's a 219 smaller community and vice chaired by Erin Zwiener, who 220 I believe represents Hays County or portions of Hays 221 County. On the Senate side, but more or less status quo, we're still in Senate Local Government which is chaired 2.2.2 223 by Paul Bettencourt out of Houston and Vice Chaired by 224 Mayes Middleton, who's out of the Galveston region. 225 Next slide.

226

227 On the policy front, primary happenings for TDHCA for 228 us, thus far, have primarily related to the budget. We 229 were in Senate Finance a couple weeks ago presenting our 230 Legislative Appropriations Request to the full Senate

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231 Finance Committee. On Monday of this week, we are in 232 front of the House Appropriations Article 7 Subcommittee 233 providing the same presentation. Good thing, I suppose, 234 is that or two good things that materialized out of 235 these two committee presentations is that both sides, 236 both the House and the Senate, incorporated all of our 237 recommendations or all of our requests into the base 238 budget and there were no questions asked, which is 239 typically pretty good if, according to Michael Lyttle, 240 my boss, that has only happened, like this is only the 241 second time in the past like quarter century that no 242 questions have been asked.

243

244 So maybe that's a good sign or maybe they were just like 245 gearing up for like the Lottery Commission or some other 246 agency who is in the TAR crosshairs right now. Going on 247 to the next slide, which is the title slide, Some Bills 248 of Interest. This is the main event for my presentation 249 today and I think these are going to be relevant to you 250 quys, but please correct me if that's not the case or if you have questions on other bills, I'll do my best to 251 252 answer those or provide additional information after the 253 meeting today, should you be interested. There are a

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number here. The first one is House Bill 492 by Morales and this prohibits consideration of LIHTC applications for developments that are beyond two miles from a grocery store, so all applications for developments have to be within two miles of a grocery store, another way to say that.

260

261 Second bill that we're following is House Bill 636 by 2.62 Representative Walle, which requires TDHCA to collaborate with the Texas Homelessness Network and 2.63 264 medical and insurance industries to improve data 265 sharing, to create a data sharing system more or less in 266 cooperative agreements where we can share data among 267 those entities concerning people who may be experiencing 2.68 homelessness.

269

270 Third is House Bill 714 and its companion, Senate Bill 271 337. This is the Tenant Readiness and Landlord 272 Incentive Pilot Program. It is a refile from last 273 session. You may be familiar with it, but the intent is 274 to help families, people fleeing domestic violence and 275 other at-risk groups, I think, leave homelessness as 276 quickly and efficiently as possible. Next is House Bill

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277 1173. This bill expands the list of cities eligible to 278 receive HHSP funds. There currently is the nine largest 279 cities and I don't have them all memorized off the top 280 of my head, but Plano, Dallas, Travis County, Tarrant 281 County, those but it now will include Lubbock, Laredo 2.82 and Irving. Last on this particular slide is House Bill 283 2016 by Representative Bucy, which establishes a housing 284 trust fund for nonprofit developers and housing support 285 services. This one is unique because it allocates the 286 dollars in the fund by percentages to different 287 activities. So 90 percent goes to nonprofit developers, 288 9 percent goes to homelessness service providers in the community, and then the remaining 1 percent, I think 289 290 goes to administrative expense.

291

Going to the next set of bills, House Bill 2132 by 292 293 Representative Bhojani allows TDHCA to add points to 294 housing tax credit applications that are reserved, or 295 the development is reserved for elderly tenants. House 296 Bill 2142 mandates a study of models to address homelessness with a particular emphasis on tiny homes. 297 298 HB 2426 by Representative Garcia established a work 299 group to study possible uses of surplus government

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300 property to provide housing to veterans experiencing 301 homelessness. House Bill 2685 requires, this group 302 actually, to study 211 and make recommendations for 303 service-enriched housing. Something to track.

304

If only one bill out of today's presentation you take 305 306 away, it's probably that one because obviously, it's relevant to y'all's charge. Going to the last set of 307 308 bills. House Bill 2724 requires TDHCA to monitor 309 homelessness shelters for discriminatory practices. 310 This is by Representative Cole. House Bill 2746 by Representative Campos is a text to donate fund for local 311 312 homelessness program, where anybody who has a cell phone 313 can donate money through their cell phone bill or their 314 cell phone provider, and they get to select the municipality to which those funds will go to provide 315 homelessness services. House Bill 2808 codifies the 316 317 youth homelessness program included or articulated in 318 Rider 16. There are slight changes. It changes the age 319 range for people eligible to participate in these services, but more or less it just codifies Rider 16. 320 321 And the last bill I want to bring to you guys today is 322 Senate Bill 399. This requires a biennial audit of

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323 state homelessness programs to assist efficiency and 324 efficacy. Obviously, that includes TDHCA homelessness 325 programs and any other state agency homelessness program 326 for that matter. Any questions about the bills that I 327 presented or bills that I didn't present?

328

329 Unidentified Speaker (0:13:33):

330 So I believe it was with HB 1116 by Representative Bucy.
331 Do you know? It seems like it's probably

(indiscernible) 0:13:43. Currently, the housing trust fund two major pieces are the Amy Young Barrier Removal Program and Bootstrap Program. Do you know if this is going to impact either of those pieces?

336

337 Matthew Lovitt (0:13:53):

338 I do not off the top of my head, but I can certainly get 339 that information and follow up with you if you'd like me 340 to.

385 are funded.

389 missed. Okay.

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392 Matthew Lovitt (0:14:32):

393 I mean, obviously, if legislators had to select which 394 fund to allocate money to, that would mean there would 395 be an impact, but in theory, just on its face, it would. 396 397 Unidentified Speaker (0:14:47): 398 Okay. I'll circle up with you then. Thanks. 399 400 Matthew Lovitt (0:14:47): 401 Okay. 402 403 Bobby Wilkinson (0:14:53): 404 Any other questions for Matthew? All right. Let the 405 record show that Blade Berkman from (indiscernible) 0:15:02 has joined us and ma'am? 406 407 Veronica Neville: 408 409 Veronica Neville from HHSC.

415 Elizabeth Yevich (0:15:12): 416 Was there anybody else on the phone? It did beep, that 417 could have been counsel? 418 419 Unidentified Speaker (0:15:16): 420 It won't make quorum. 421 422 Elizabeth Yevich (0:15:17): 423 Although it wouldn't make forum. Okay. I think I could 424 say hello. 425 426 Bobby Wilkinson (0:15:24): All right. Now, Jeremy's going to update us on the '25 427 428 to '29 consolidated plan. 429 430 Jeremy Stremler (0:15:30): 431 Yes. So similar to the last meeting in October, just 432 wanted to come, let everyone know that we are working on 433 the consolidated plan and the associated sections of 434 that plan which govern how we will operate our community 435 and planning development programs from HUD over the next 436 five years. We're in the process of compiling that and 437 we do expect to have a draft in April to go out for

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438 public comment. Of course, it will be most likely with 439 our estimates, which will be just get funding levels 440 from the previous year.

441

442 Until Congress passes a budget in some form, we do not know final numbers. And once they do pass the budget, 443 444 if necessary, we will make adjustments to those plans 445 before submitting the final version to our board for 446 approval and then to HUD for approval. But this is an 447 opportunity. If anyone has any questions or suggestions 448 on how those programs operate or anything they could do 449 differently, we welcome you to let us know here or you 450 can send me an email with any suggestions or questions 451 or concerns you might have related to that.

452

453 Bobby Wilkinson (0:16:53):

454 You didn't share a draft plan or email, did you? 455

456 Jeremy Stremler (0:16:55):

457 No. No. So the draft will go out. Again, after our 458 April board meeting is when we plan on taking the draft 459 of the entire plan to go out for public comment for 460 review by everybody and we welcome you to look at it

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461 then. Again, the numbers will not be final, unless 462 March 14th, as Bill said, rolls by and a budget is 463 passed, then the version that we take out will have real 464 numbers in it. Whether it will be going out in April, 465 if a budget is passed in March is to be seen, depending 466 on what those numbers look like and if any additional 467 work needs to be done, but that's kind of where it's at. 468 And welcome any questions or comments.
